



NATIONAL HEALTHCARE DECISIONS DAY

Some may question why such steps are necessary. But, there are many reasons to explore and implement these steps. Consider the following examples that demonstrate the importance of advance planning:

- * Inability to speak for yourself/voice your wishes
- * Sudden illness or injury
- * Assists in guiding your loved ones with honoring your wishes
- * Gives your loved ones peace of mind

In all honesty, none of us like to think about suffering from illness or experiencing a life-threatening illness. As difficult as it may be for us to consider these issues and make such decisions, it is even more difficult when our loved ones are faced with these decisions on our behalf. Executing advance directives such as a living will, healthcare power of attorney, or five wishes, can alleviate this burden for loved ones. In many ways, advance care planning is a gift to your family. Start the conversation today and make your wishes known by giving this special gift to your loved ones!



March 30 is Doctors' Day, an annual observance aimed at appreciating physicians. In our case here at Richmond County Hospice, our Doctors and Providers concentrate on enhancing comfort, reducing pain and suffering, and perhaps most importantly, improving quality of life in helping patients and their families cope with the challenges of a terminal illness. Hospice Physicians provide a holistic approach to patients addressing physical, emotional, practical, social, and spiritual needs.

The holiday first started in 1933 in Winder, Georgia, and since then it's been honored every year on March 30 which was the first anniversary of a doctor using ether anesthesia by Dr. Crawford W. Long. Today, we continue to celebrate medical advances like these and thank all doctors everywhere who've spent so much time and energy mastering their field of expertise.

Physicians have been around for centuries, always in search of bettering the practice of medicine. In 500BC the first physicians swore to the Greek gods that their work in healing would meet ethical standards, which was named the Hippocratic Oath. By 1400AD the word "Physician" was included in the third edition of the shorter Oxford English Dictionary. Most importantly for hospice care, Dame Cicely Saunders was born on June 22, 1918. She was a trained Nurse, Medical Social Worker, and finally a Physician. In 1948, she became involved with the care of patients with terminal illnesses and in 1967 she founded St. Christopher's Hospice as the first hospice linking expert pain and symptom control with compassionate care, teaching, and clinical research. By 1969, Dr. Cicely Saunders pioneered the first home care team taking St. Christopher's care and philosophy out into the community. This became the birthplace of the modern hospice movement which came to the United States in the late 1970's-early 1980's.

We are thankful for the practice of medicine as well as the founder of the hospice movement, but most importantly, for our Hospice Medical Director, Dr. Steven Strobel, who carries on the mission and care of hospice in our community with his team of providers: Susan McDonald, FNP and Dr. Beaux Slaughter.

I lost my father recently and going to church singing songs like “it is well” has not been easy. During times of grief, we often feel that it is not well with our soul. It is almost like having a hole inside of you that cannot be filled. Grief hits us in different ways, we all experience grief in our lives but how that grief affects us or how difficult grief may be is different for all of us.

For me dealing with my father's death has been much harder than I ever imagined. Working for a hospice for 12 years you would think that I would be able to deal with my grief without any issues. But I am finding out that is not true.

Helping people with their grief over the past years has taught me a lot about grief, but actually going through the grief myself is not the same as holding someone's hand. As I was thinking about the song “it is well”, I had to really think about what the song is saying. So, I wanted to tell the story of how this song was written. I’m praying that this will help someone!

Horatio Spafford, a prosperous lawyer, real estate investor, and devout Presbyterian elder, lived comfortably in Chicago with his wife, Anna, and their children.

The year 1871 was a difficult one for the Spafford's. Much of Horatio's real estate investments disappeared in the great Chicago Fire. Not long after, they lost their 4-year-old son to scarlet fever. But worse still was to come.

Knowing that his friend D. L. Moody would preach in England in 1873, Spafford's family decided to vacation in Europe. Last-minute business detained Horatio, so Anna and their four girls sailed on the ocean liner *S.S. Ville du Havre*. En route, a British vessel rammed the ship, and it sank within minutes. Rescuers picked up an unconscious Anna on a floating spar, but all four daughters drowned. When Anna arrived in England, she sent a telegram to Horatio with the words, “Saved alone.”

Horatio immediately left Chicago to bring his wife home. On the Atlantic crossing, the captain called Horatio to his cabin to tell him that they had nearly reached the spot where his four daughters had perished. As he passed over their watery grave, Spafford wrote a hymn of profound depth that has touched millions: “It Is Well with My Soul.”

He later wrote to Anna's half-sister, “On Thursday last we passed over the spot where she went down, in mid-ocean, the waters three miles deep. But I do not think of our dear ones there. They are safe, folded, the dear lambs.”

The pain was great, but God's grace rose to the occasion. Despite his heartbreak, Spafford could say without pretense, “It is well with my soul.”

So now when we sing “It is well with my soul,” I understand it a little differently. I see it as a future hope. It is well that my dad and I will be reunited someday. It is well that he is forever healed. It is well that someday we will get to play golf together on a heavenly golf course. It is well that we will enjoy Jesus presents together, finally free from all pain and sicknesses.

Whatever your “It is not well with your soul” is, I pray that you'll hand it to God and know that He sees your hurt and doesn't ask you to fake and put a smile on your face. Grief is hard! Yet, if you choose to walk through grief looking to Jesus to hold your hand, it will bring happiness in your life.

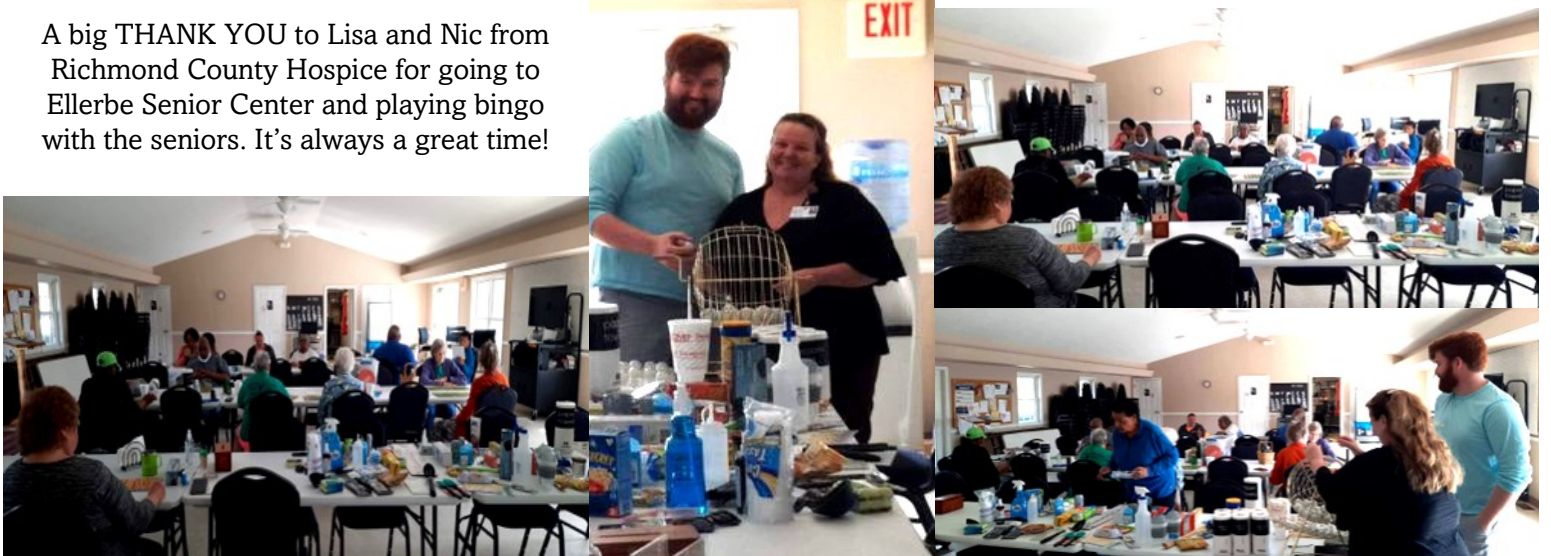


What's Happening
